Join the California Native Plant Society and the U.S. Forest Service on the first weekend in August for a Rare Plant Treasure Hunt in the El Dorado National Forest in a search for rare moonworts!

We will look for these tiny ferns in creeks, seeps, and wet meadows. These ferns have been found on nearby private lands, and good potential habitat exists on the USFS lands.

Trip Details... Meet at the Loon Lake Boat Ramp Parking Lot at 10:30AM on Saturday, August 6<sup>th</sup>. Be prepared to hike through some wet areas, and search for some very low-growing plants (1-20cm tall!). ## LEAD A WRIGHT'S LAKE WILDFLOWER WALK IN LATE JULY OR AUGUST

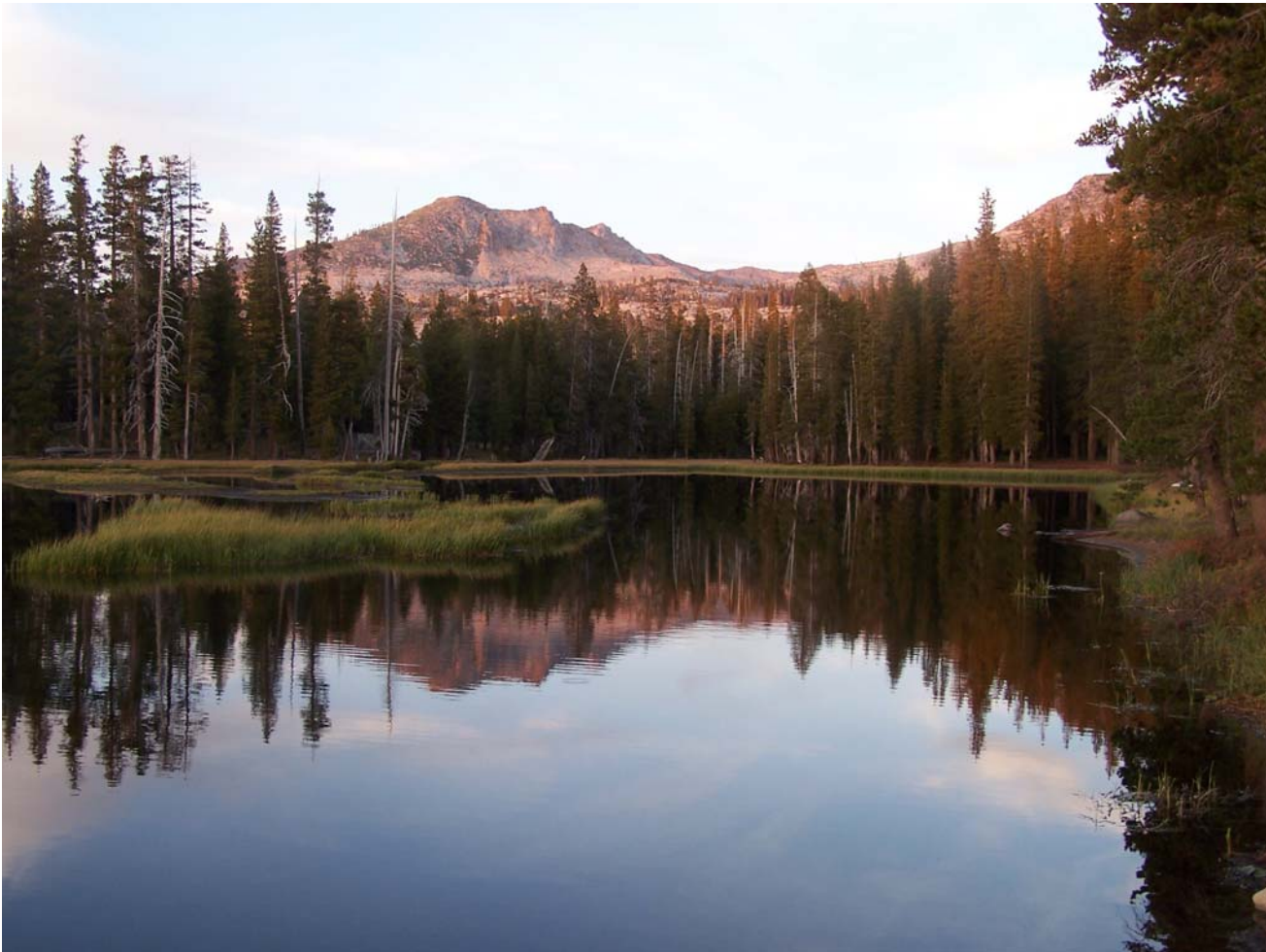
In the summer of 2006, Board Member Rich Wade started an innovative partnership between the Chapter and the Eldorado National Forest: wildflower walks at Wright's Lake. As he wrote in the CNPS Bulletin, "Wright's Lake offered the perfect combination of nature-loving campers and a diverse, showy flora. Nestled in a red fir-lodgepole forest at 7,000 feet, the lake features a variety of plant habitats, a complex of hiking trails, and a tranquil setting." For those who haven't yet visited Wright's Lake, it's one of the most easily accessible gems of the Forest. In addition to the lovely high mountain lake, it is a trailhead for entry into the Desolation Wilderness Area, and thus popular with hikers as well as family camping parties, especially from Sacramento and the Bay Area. Over the five year period that wildflower walks have been held, resources for walk leaders have been developed. There is good introductory information on the spectacular geology and physical habitat features around the lake, such as moraines and gravelly glacial deposits, rock barrens, and streams. There is a comprehensive plant list. A very user-friendly list of the most frequently seen flowers and shrubs for each habitat type will also be available this summer. For those who don't feel ready to lead a walk, accompany a leader for training so that you can see just how fun wildflower walks here are. Help others discover and value the natural history and beautiful wildflowers and flowering shrubs of the Sierra Nevada as you do.

While past years' wildflower walks have begun in June or early July, this year's walks have been pushed back due to the heavy snow pack. Wright's Lake campground will open this year on July 21. Walk leaders are being sought from July 23<sup>rd</sup> through the end of August. Wildflower walks are held on Saturday mornings at 10 a.m. They start off from the Twin Lakes trailhead on the east side of the lake, reached by taking the road past the campgrounds to the large parking lot at the road's end. The trailhead meeting point is on the north (downhill) end of the parking lot. Walk leaders should arrive early for the 10 a.m. walk as this parking lot quickly fills up. The walk route is short, flattish, and easy, suitable for all but the very youngest and oldest. Walks are generally about 1 hour long, although this may be extended if there's interest. Common plant names are preferred in order to reach the largest number of people.

### How to Submit a Photo:

- Make sure you own the photograph or have permission to use it.
- Crop, brighten, sharpen, and otherwise enhance it so that the picture best conveys your subject.
- DO NOT EXCEED 500 pixels tall by 800 pixels wide.
- Include the photographer's name, the date the picture was taken, and the place it was taken.
- Include the common name and the scientific name (Genus and species) if possible.
- Include a caption if you would like one.
- Email the photo to Steve Tyron ([artdoc@calweb.com](mailto:artdoc@calweb.com)).
