The El Dorado Chapter has just completed its fifth year of hosting seasonal wildflower walks at Wright's Lake. Since 2006, informal walks designed to introduce our native flora to campers, cabin owners, and other visitors to the lake have been conducted every Saturday morning throughout the flowering season. In spite of a curtailed season this year due to the heavy snowpack,

Chapter members led 6 walks from July 24 through August 28, hosting over 50 attendees in all. Because of the variety of environments encountered around

the lake, dozens of species of flowering plants may be examined during this short walk within the allotted time of one hour. The combination of beautiful and varied flowers, the gorgeous environs, and the friendly and interested folks who attend the walks continues to make this endeavor fun and gratifying for leaders and attendees alike. NEWS FLASH: STATE LEADERS RECOGNIZE CALIFORNIA NATIVE PLANTS

The State Legislature just passed a bill (ACR 173) declaring Native Plant Week as the third week of April that is intended to "encourage community groups, schools, and citizens to undertake appropriate activities

to promote the conservation, restoration, and appreciation of California's native plants."

CITIZEN SCIENCE: RARE PLANT TREASURE HUNT

The Rare Plant Treasure Hunt is a new statewide effort, initiated by the Rare Plant and Education Programs of the California Native Plant Society, to update data on rare plants and their associated habitats.

The Treasure Hunt teams botanists with amateurs to search for new and historic populations of rare plants across the state. Participants can survey for rare plants in areas with little history of botanical exploration, relocate historic (not documented in over 20 years) rare plant occurrences, and/or update known occurrences of high-priority rare plants. Up-to-date information on rare plants and their habitats are needed to inform conservation actions and to aid planning efforts. The current status of many rare plant occurrences is unknown, and thousands have not been documented for decades.

The preliminary results for first season of the Rare Plant Treasure Hunt are in and they are stupendous! Results include:

- Volunteers and partner organizations updated approximately 600 rare plant occurrences (populations) across the state.
- Of these, approximately 70% were new occurrences (previously unreported populations)
- Approximately 70% were List 1B (Rare, threatened and endangered in California and elsewhere).
- An estimated 245 volunteers and partners contributed
- These volunteers gave over 2500 hours of time to the project!
- Over 20 chapters had participating volunteers.

FUN FOR KIDS

The Treasure Hunt has been successful bringing people of all ages and backgrounds together to enjoy nature and learn about plants. The activity energizes children and teenagers, as well as adults. Young people enjoy the hunt — looking for the plants and finding them once they have the search image in mind. Hiking on the way to locations, leaders offered many other plant tidbits to discover.

Some highlights of this year include:

- An Eagle Scout who did a Treasure Hunt project in the Mojave,
- Two teenage girls who had never been camping before, attended a training and will focus a CNPS internship on getting other teenagers out to look for plants (with an experienced trip-leader/botanist),
- A homeschool network hooked up with a team leader to go out on trips,
- A 20 year old woman, who had never been on a hike before, participated.
- The San Gabriel Mountains and San Diego chapters contributing tremendous numbers of volunteer hours (429 hrs and 420 hrs respectively) and occurrence updates (27 and 24 respectively).
- The BLM, DFG, RSABG, National Parks and Parks Conservancy, East Bay Regional Parks, and Santa Clara County Parks are participating and contributing funds, staff time, office space, volunteer coordinators, volunteers, and enthusiasm.

XERISCAPE GARDEN IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

Xeriscaping is a water-efficient landscaping that is appropriate to the naturally arid environment of El Dorado County. While the goal of xeriscaping is to create a visually attractive landscape that uses water efficiently, the practice also can conserve tremendous amounts of water, reduce or eliminate soil amendments and chemicals, provide a more attractive environment for wildlife, and restore natural drainage patterns. The Xeriscape Program in El Dorado County consists of three xeriscape demonstration gardens available to the public which illustrate the benefits and advantages of xeriscaping. These Gardens are located at the Placerville Branch Library, Cameron Park Branch Library, and the County Fairgrounds. The Xeriscape Program in the Georgetown Divide consists of one xeriscape demonstration garden located at the Georgetown Public Utility District. Located in high-traffic areas, the gardens are equipped with signage and xeriscape source information for landowners interested in obtaining additional assistance.

The El Dorado County and Georgetown divide Resource Conservation Districts (RCD seek to update each of the xeriscape demonstration gardens and provide an educational experience for the public during the renovation process. This will be accomplished through the following tasks:

- Task 1:** Acquire new plants and replace dead or dying and cover exposed areas with non toxic mulch cover.
- Task 2:** Replace old signage. These signs identify the plant species.
- Task 3:** Update the Self Guided Tour Manual. These manuals provide a plant pallet, design map, and information on Xeriscape and water conservation measures. These books are available at each location for free to the public.
- Task 4:** Create a volunteer program to perform monthly garden maintenance such as mulch replacement, plant trimming, weed removal, etc.

The management of the program will be the responsibility of the RCD. The RCD will collaborate with the El Dorado Chapter of the California Native Plant Society (El Do-

rado CNPS) and volunteer community members to accomplish some of these tasks.

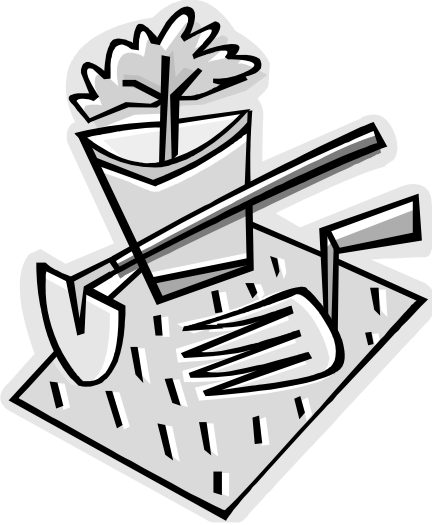
The RCD will work in partnership with the El Dorado CNPS to (1) Inventory the existing vegetation and provide expert advice on new plant selection and design; (2) Update the text and garden maps in the Xeriscape Handbook; and (3) Ask chapter members, through newsletter and email, to volunteer for monthly garden maintenance.

Our chapter tried to use the xeriscape garden at the Placerville Library during Earth Day as an educational experience for kids. We had trouble finding the plants as well as having to put up temporary signs to identify the plants! I have a list of a few people that were interested in helping out. Please let Cindy know if you are interested (clpodsiadlo@yahoo.com or 642-0648). Our first task will be to inventory the existing vegetation (both native and non-native) and compare the locations to what is listed on the maps at the Placerville library. I will set up a garden meeting in September based on who is available and when.
